



All: Whoever comes to Christ will never be hungry. Whoever believes in Christ will never be thirsty. Whoever comes to Jesus, he will never drive away.

One: As Jesus took the bread and cup and gave thanks before sharing them, so we also give thanks before God at this table.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

One: People of Christmas, the Lord be with you.

All: God's Spirit is present in us and among us.


One: People of the Star, open your hearts to God.

All: We open our hearts to the One who is always with us.

One: People of faith, offer joyful songs of thanksgiving to God.

All: We will sing songs of praise to God who revealed the depth of love in the Child of Bethlehem.

One: We give you thanks, God of mercy and grace, for creating our beautiful planet and raising us from the humus of the Earth by the breath of your being. We rejoice that you have called the entire human family to this table of hope. We come here in remembrance and celebration of the gift of your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, whom you sent to bring light into the darkness of human history. We bless you, gracious God, for the presence of your Holy Spirit in the church gathered here. With your sons and daughters in faith in all places and times we praise you with joy, singing:



One: O God, we thank you for the gift of Jesus Christ. At our Savior's birth, the angels sang a message of peace on earth. At the beginning of his ministry, Jesus proclaimed that he had come to bring good news to the poor, release to the outcaste, and recovery of sight to the blind, and to let the oppressed go free. He taught that those who work for your peace will be called your children. He prayed for unity among all who would follow him. He wept over people's failure to know the things that make for peace. He suffered and died for the sins of the world. Through our Lord's resurrection, you broke the powers of oppression, sin and death. Our risen Savior greeted his followers with the word of peace. We thank you that Christ reigns with you in glory and continues to bring your peace into our lives. And now reunited on this table in bread and in the cup,
So, Lord, may your whole church soon be gathered together,
From the corners of the earth into your kingdom.

All: Blessed be God, now and forever.

One: Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor are yours, O God, now and forever.

All: Amen.

THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION AT PLYMOUTH CONGREGATIONAL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST (UCC)

"Do this in remembrance of me." Luke 22:19c (NRSV)

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The Lord's Supper, also known as "The Eucharist," "Last Supper," and "Holy Communion" is a sign of God's love and grace manifested in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In eating the bread and drinking from the cup, Christians are united with the Living Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit. The sacrament of Holy Communion is a reminder of what Jesus did in the past, a symbol of our present relationship with him and a promise of what he will do in the future. And so, during the Great Prayer of Thanksgiving we often proclaim the mystery of our faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

During his earthly ministry, Christ shared meals with his followers and sat at dinner tables of sinners and outcasts to show the world the reality of God's unconditional love. On the night before he was crucified, Jesus broke bread and shared the cup with his disciples. He spoke of these elements as his body and blood given for humanity. Just as humans need food and drink for nurture and sustenance, the Holy Meal that Christians


share at Communion is spiritual nourishment for those who believe. Those who partake of the bread and the fruit of the vine are renewed and empowered to be the Body of Christ in today's world.

Holy Communion is more than just a memorial celebration. We believe that the elements maintain their substance during communion, but we affirm that the Living Christ is present with us in the breaking of bread and sharing of the cup. In the act of receiving communion, we are united with the Living Christ and with one another.

The invitation to the Table is not just for members of this church; all people of faith, including children, are welcome to participate in the sacrament of Holy Communion. It does not matter if you have much faith or if your trust in God is wavering; if you are a strong believer or if you have doubts, you are welcome to experience God's grace, love and extravagant welcome at the Table.

At Plymouth Congregational United Church of Christ (UCC), we celebrate Holy Communion on the first Sunday of each month. The elements are either served in the traditional manner with the congregation seated or offered by intinction. When intinction is used, you are invited to come forward, take a piece of bread, dip it into the cup and immediately partake of the elements. Please, use the center aisle to come to the Communion Table and return to your seats by way of the side aisles.

May the peace and grace of Christ be with you.
