

Thoughts on the Season of Lent

As we approach the season of Lent, I approach it as an evolutionary biologist rather than a true believer. Belief in a creator must have some sort of evolutionary underpinnings, as many cultures not only have a god, but also accessory deities (such as Jesus, Buddha, Mohammed and other leaders of modern day and/or ancient religious beliefs). Just as physical adaptations in all living things must provide some sort of advantage to them, so must behavioral actions. In the long run, creatures lacking features that adapt them to their environment are less successful than those that have functional adaptations. Unless those organisms come to have more effective adaptations, they go extinct.

Organisms that are narrowly physically and behaviorally adapted to their environments do well over the short period of time, but what happens if that environment changes. Unless there is genetic diversity amongst that population of creatures, it is likely that their over-adaption to that particular environment foretells their imminent extinction. Thus, all though specific adaptation to one's environment is important over the short haul, genetic diversity over the long haul is just as, if not more important.

How do these biologic principles apply to human existence and what Lenten lesson do they provide for us? Various societies have been extremely successful in the past. If one has visited the American southwest and viewed the cliff dwellings and other artifacts located throughout those states, one comes away with sense of amazement with respect to the folks to who built and lived in those dwellings. How come no one is living in them now? Apparently, those societies were adapted to a particular climatic regime and when those conditions changed their livelihood was impacted and those dwelling locations were no longer viable. If they were to survive as a society, they had to move and adapt to the new conditions.

What does this say of our modern situation? If we as a nation want to last as a society, then we must not only stress adaptability in our society (i.e., a willingness to accept different modes of human sexuality, different modes of religious beliefs, different modes of work), but also work towards diversity not only in our societal environment, but also in our ecological environment. A world that is only white and evangelical will not survive. A world where 1% own all the resources will not survive. A world where the well-to-do inhabitants live in locked enclaves will not survive. A world in which hundreds of species go extinct every year will not survive. A world in which we ravage our environment rather than apply stewardship to it, will not survive. We must support societal and ecologic diversity. We must have equality amongst ourselves and the living creatures of the earth. If we support these efforts, then we as humans might have a chance to continue into the next millennium.




How might we reflect on our baptism and/or confirmation during the Lenten season. We join the local church and Church universal in a communion of reflection, for one. What else might we consider during this time?


0 Sacred Head, Now Wounded, with grief and shame weighed down, Now scornfully surrounded with thorns, thine only crown:

Past days once saw Lent as a time of abstaining or giving up something like chocolate, meat or drug and alcohol abstention; naming it "sacrifice!" Galatians 5:5 For through the Spirit we eagerly await by faith the righteousness for which we hope.



Day 36:

Matthew 4: 1 - 7

1Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. 2He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished. 3The tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread.' 4But he answered, 'It is written,

"One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." '

5 Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, 6saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you",

and "On their hands they will bear you up,

so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." '

7Jesus said to him, 'Again it is written, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." '

- a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;
- 6 a time to seek, and a time to lose;
- a time to keep, and a time to throw away;
- 7 a time to tear, and a time to sew;
- a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;
- 8 a time to love, and a time to hate:
- a time for war, and a time for peace.
- 9 What gain have the workers from their toil? 10I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with. 11He has made everything suitable for its time; moreover, he has put a sense of past and future into their minds, yet they cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end.

For years, Christians have argued about whether or not Jesus had to die. For today, let us rest in scripture and know that no matter where we land theologically or with regard to our belief or doubt, God holds us and meets us, just as we are.

Let this be so today.

Day 38:

Mark 1: 9- 13:

9 In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. 10And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. 11And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved;* with you I am well pleased.'

12 And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. 13He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

14 Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news* of God,* 15and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near;* repent, and believe in the good news.'*

How might you walk in the water with Jesus today?

Do you realize you are beloved and a child of God? If not, pause now to center your attention on this fact. You are beloved. God loves you.

Prayer: Holy One, let me understand how deeply loved I am and let me walk alongside Christ. Even in my own wilderness God is by my side. Amen.
